
Eradication of Bay Snook and Blue Mbuna

Pinecrest Gardens (formally Parrot Jungle)



- Koi found throughout Gardens
- Donated, fish attraction
- Highly valued





- Pacu, Redtail catfish, Ripsaw catfish
- Tarpon, Snook
- All donated





Bay (Giant) Snook (Petenia splendida)

- Discovered in April 2014
- Native to Atlantic slope of Mexico, Guatemala and Belize
- Primarily a riverine species
- Not a snook
- Piscivorous, up to 50 cm TL













Blue mbuna (Labeotropheus fuelleborni)

- Rift Lake cichlid
- Forage on aufwuchs
- Only found in waterfall pond
- SE Florida urban canals likely suitable habitat
- Not collected from the wild














Entrance Pond

- Small, shallow, isolated
- Release site for exotic fish




















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Escapement Mitigation



Pinecrest Monitoring





May 2016 to March 2017



Limited to seining, minnow traps, backpack electrofisher and hook an line due to presence of high value nonnative fish (e.g., koi, pacu, redtail catfish, etc.)

Hurricane Irma, September 10, 2017



Impacts:

Lots of vegetation in water; loss of power; flooding; koi, pacu, catfish moved out of ponds and died when water dropped and stranded them on land; Bay Snook moved into waterfall pond;



Blue mbuna stayed put

Opportunity (Silver Lining!)

- Most high value fish gone.
- Pinecrest agreeable to rotenone renovation.













FWC staff applied rotenone


Fish were collected for 3 days



Renovation Results

- Removed 8 nonnative spp.
- 1,177 fish
- Spotted tilapia, Black acara, Bay snook, Blue mbuna primary species
- A few Walking catfish survived





- No Bay Snook observed in follow-up sampling.
- Renovation considered successful!
- Native fish restocked
- Multi-agency and Pinecrest Gardens cooperation
- Prevention messaging
- Connection to Snake Creek restored (flood abatement)
- Checking site in November 2018
